- Bunting, Eve. [*Smoky Night*](#). San Diego, CA: Harcourt Brace, 1994. A boy and his mother worry as riots spread through their neighborhood. The events of the evening bring neighbors together.
- Choi, Yangsook. [*The Name Jar*](#). New York, NY: Knopf, 2001. A Korean girl considers changing her name after she is teased by her new classmates.
- DeRolf, Shane. [*The Crayon Box That Talked*](#). New York, NY: Random House, 1997. A young girl helps crayons see the value of other colors.
- Dumont, Jean-François. [*The Chickens Build A Wall*](#). Grand Rapids, MI: Eerdmans Books for Young Readers, 2013. When a hedgehog appears in the farm yard, fear and prejudice incite ridiculous behavior among the chickens.
- Egan, Tim. [*Metropolitan Cow*](#). Boston, MA: Houghton Mifflin Co., 1996. Much to his parents' dismay, a young calf befriends the new pig next door. Their friendship helps the cows overcome their prejudices.
- Geisel, Theodor Seuss. [*The Sneetches*](#). New York, NY: Random House, 1989. Star bellied Sneetches discriminate against plain bellied Sneetches. Eventually they come to see that all Sneetches are equal.
- Isadora, Rachel. [*The Ugly Duckling*](#). New York, NY: G. P. Putnam's Sons, 2009. The story from Hans Christian Andersen, retold in an African setting. A gray duckling is ostracized by the other animals on the farm.
- McCarney, Rosemary. [*Dear Malala, We Stand With You*](#). New York, NY: Crown Books, 2015. Girls inspired by the words and actions of Malala Yousafzai speak up for an end of discrimination against and mistreatment of girls.
- Milgrim, David. [*Some Monsters Are Different*](#). New York, NY: Henry Holt and Co, 2013. Celebrates the diversity among monsters.
- Mol, Sine van. [*Meena*](#). Grand Rapids, MI: Eerdmans Books for Young Readers, 2011. Neighborhood children persecute a woman because of the way she looks. Her granddaughter helps reform their vision and behavior.

Myers, Christopher. [*Wings*](#). New York, NY: Scholastic Press, 2000. The narrator worries what might happen to Ikarus because he is different. She is moved to befriend him.

Serres, Alain. [*I Have The Right To Be A Child*](#). Groundwood Books, 2012. Illustrates the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child.

Shange, Ntozake. [*Whitewash*](#). New York, NY: Walker and Co., 1998. A girl and her brother encounter bigoted attackers on the walk home from school. What follows is her emotional response to being spray painted white.

Wahl, Jan. [*Candy Shop*](#). Watertown, MA: Charlesbridge. Daniel and his aunt seek to help the Taiwanese owner of the candy shop when cruel graffiti appears on her sidewalk.
