# **BIBLIOGRAPHY: WORSHIPING TOGETHER**

This bibliography is generally based on "Our Order of Worship", <u>a guide to the order of worship</u> provided by the Presbyterian Church(USA). The following bibliography uses only the main headings of that document. A more detailed breakdown of the parts of worship is available at that website.

When helpful, a brief explanation of the specific part of worship connecting to each book follows its description and is noted in italics.. A few links to books that have been reviewed on *Storypath* are also included. Our Theme Index also includes reviews tagging topics like praise, communion, baptism, prayer, etc. We hope you will add additional suggestions in the comments.

#### **WE ENTER**

- dePaola, Tomie. <u>The Song of Francis</u>. G. P. Putnam's Sons, 2009. Francis is inspired to sing a song of praise because he is filled with God's love.
- Gal, Susan. <u>Please Take Me For a Walk</u>. New York, NY: Knopf, 2010. Describing all the wonderful things that will happen on a walk, a dog awaits the reader's response. As the service begins, we are called to respond to God through the act of worship.
- Schlein, Miriam. Hello, Hello. New York, NY: Simon, 2002. Explores the way various animals greet one another when they come together. As we gather for worship, we greet one another in love.
- Stoop, Naoko. <u>Red Knit Cap Girl</u>. New York, NY: Little, 2012. A girl and her friends discover the way to meet with the moon is through darkness and silence. *In moments of silence and meditation, we seek to meet with God.*

#### **CONFESSION OF SIN AND RESPONSE**

- Ashman, Linda. <u>Peace, Baby!</u> San Francisco: Chronicle, 2013. Children are encouraged to share peace following difficult experiences with loved ones and to spread peace to everyone near and far. The refrain "Peace, baby!" could easily be replaced with the words "Peace be with you," or whatever phrase is traditionally spoken in your congregation.
- Dyckman, Ame. <u>Horrible Bear!</u> New York, NY: Little, 2016. In her anger, a girl is cruel to a bear after he accidentally breaks her kite; after she accidentally breaks her 'stuffie', she apologizes to the bear. Sin results in broken relationships with one another and with God, realizing that we are all sinful, we turn to God in confession, seeking repair and transformation.

- Freedman, Deborah. <u>Blue Chicken</u>. New York: Viking, 2011. Chicken is so sorry after she makes a mistake, turning the farmyard and animals blue. Water washes the blue away, returning the farm to its intended state of being. *In the Assurance of Pardon we may be reminded of God's forgiveness through the touching, pouring, or lifting of the waters of baptism.*
- Kirk, Daniel. <u>You are Not My Friend but I Miss You</u>. New York, NY: Abrams, 2014. A sock monkey thinks the dog has not been a good friend to him. When monkey realizes he hasn't been a good friend to dog, he seeks to restore their friendship. *Through confession we seek to restore broken relationships with God and one another.*

- Archer, Micha. <u>Daniel Finds a Poem</u>. New York, NY: Paulsen, 2016. Daniel hears poetry through his experience of nature at the park. We hear God speaking to us through our experience of the proclamation of the Word.
- Fan, Terry and Eric. <u>The Night Gardener</u>. New York, NY: Simon, 2016. William watches his neighborhood transform night after night and the trees are shaped into beautiful topiaries. In the same way the night gardener opened up the wonder of the trees to the people of Grimloch Lane, we pray for God's Spirit to open up and illuminate scripture for us.
